Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." (Luke 2:28-32)

Whenever I read this prayer of Simeon, it keeps me in silent meditation. It invites me to imagine his lifelong waiting and final joy. This passage always deeply moves me. It teaches and reminds the meaning of Advent.

Now we are in the Season of Advent. For many people, the Season of Advent and Christmas is a time for shopping madness and family gathering. As we know, however, buying more things and consuming more things are not the meaning of this Holy Season. This is the time of preparation for the coming of Christ, our Lord.

To respond to this coming Christ means to invite Jesus to live in our life. It means opening the door and inviting our Christ Jesus in. God promised that for those who accept Jesus, they will be called daughters and sons of God. They become a part of God's family. When we meet Jesus, there should be changes in our course of life. Transformation! This is the time to renew our encountering with Jesus Christ, the Lord of our life!

A man was giving his testimony at one of old Salvation Army open-air street meetings. As he was testifying, a heckler in the crowd yelled. "Why don't you shut up and sit down? You are just dreaming." Immediately that heckler felt a tug on his coat. He looked down and found a little girl, who said, "Sir, may I speak to you? That man is my daddy. Daddy used to be a drunkard. He used to spend all of the money he made on whiskey. My mom was very sad and would cry most of the time. Sometimes when my daddy would come home, he would hit my mom. I didn't have shoes or a dress to wear to school. But look at my shoes and this pretty dress. My daddy bought these for me." But the little girl wasn't through with the heckler yet. "See my mom over there. She is the one with the bright smile on her face. She sings even when she is doing the ironing." Then the little girl said, "Sir, if my daddy is dreaming, please don't wake him up."

What will we do in this Season of Advent and Christmas? Will we simply go with shopping and social gatherings that most of us missed last year, immersing ourselves in the parties without Jesus and come away unaffected? Or will we stay awake and make an effort to meet Jesus and to be transformed? **The choice we make will determine whether we have a Merry Christmas without or with Jesus.** 

I wish we can pray and praise together in this Christmas: Thank you Lord for coming into the world, for living and dying in our place, and for giving eternal life for us. Today we give our hearts. No longer we will refuse by saying, "No, we have no room for you." We humbly invite you to be born within us, and live in our life throughout our days. Now we rejoice and born again because of your love and grace. Amen.

# A Message from William Ness, the Music Director

Many of us first think of the music associated with Christmas at this time of the year. If you do any shopping in department stores you are bound to hear standard familiar carols over and over most of which you can sing theoretically in your mind, so you do know them. The church brings about Christmas through the season of Advent which encompasses four Sundays leading to Christmas to prepare us for the arrival of Christmas. It is a time when we experience the waiting of the Messiah as described in the Hebrew scriptures through the prophets. Christ was in the plan from the beginning but people on earth were still surprised at his appearance.

On December 12, the third Sunday in Advent, is when you will experience prophecies of Christ in the Advent Service of Lessons and Carols through the reading of Hebrew scripture and in music from a chorus from *Messiah* to Vivaldi's *Gloria* first movement. In between those works will be a setting of the text of O Come, O Come, Emmanuel by Elaine Hagenberg entitled, *O Come, Emmanuel.* This anthem has cello and piano accompaniment. *Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus* by Charles Wesley is another anthem set to music by Hal Hopson for choir, string quartet and flute. This work was commissioned by the Center for Sacred Music at Virginia Wesleyan College in celebration of the 300th anniversary of the 1707 birth of Charles Wesley. The last new work we will sing is by Karen Marrolli based on Isaiah 65:17-25 scripture entitled *Great Creator.* This anthem is accompanied by string quartet and written for the Chancel choir of First UMC of Trussville, Alabama. Considering all these musical connections this will truly be a United Methodist musical celebration of the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Both choir our Ghanaian and Wesley choirs will participate in this celebration, and I hope you will too. Our string players will present two quartets on familiar tunes and the flutist will play two advent hymns arranged for flute and organ in the Prelude and one flute solo in the service.

This is a service to be cherished for its rich musical inspiration to illuminate the wonderful scriptures detailing Christ's first and second coming. Ending the service will be everyone singing Charles Wesley's wonderful hymn *Lo, He comes with clouds Descending*.

These will be given out with a January Community Breakfast which would probably be a packaged take-out meal. In 2019 you created 98 Advent Gifts so we gave some to a shelter and that could happen again. Please place items from the list below in a shoebox (or Wesley UMC plastic bag, if we're able to supply them) with a Christmas card. Then <u>bring to Brewer Hall your wrapped gift box</u> (or bag with tissue paper) by Dec. 19th.

We have shortened the list below to include only the most needed gifts which are easily recognizable to folks from other cultures. Also, we found that the cans of fruits & vegetables were too heavy for homeless people and single serve cups were more usable. We think that reusable bags are helpful to homeless folks, while shoeboxes work for others. Please use shoeboxes (not boot boxes) and the gift is complete when the shoebox is full (no need to include all on the list). *Also add a plastic spoon & knife* which a homeless person would need.

1<sup>st</sup> We need material help. We will be looking for donations of new or excellent condition, clean winter coats, new hats, new mittens/gloves, and warm scarves. These can be brought in on Sunday mornings and left in the large box labeled COAT PROJECT that will be on a table outside the office, in Brewer Hall.

We also need strong hangers and, if anyone has a clothing rack they aren't currently using, we could definitely use a few more of those as well.

- 2<sup>nd</sup> We need physical help in multiple ways in the shop...

We have already begun to move merchandise in this week and plan to begin sorting next Sunday after church. ## **Did You Know**

One of the cherished musical aspects of our worship as we approach Christmas is the opportunity to sing carols. Although we most commonly associate the singing of carols with the Christmas season, there are also carols for other seasons of the liturgical year, including Advent, Lent, Holy Week and Easter. It is speculated that one reason that there are so many Christmas carols is that they were used at feasts and banquets that accompanied the festive celebration of the twelve days of Christmas. Did you ever wonder why we refer to these songs of the season as carols rather than as hymns, which is the term we use for most of the congregational song in worship?

Carols as a musical genre first originated in England in the Middle Ages as a round or line dance with musical accompaniment. Eventually the term was used for songs with English or Latin texts related to Mary or some aspect of Christmas. Many carol texts are macaronic i.e. a mixture of two languages, usually Latin and a vernacular language. (An example of a macaronic text would be "Angels We Have Heard on High" with stanzas in English and a Latin refrain *Gloria in excelsis Deo*.) The content of medieval carols was narrative, dramatic or lyrical and was intended to inspire ordinary Christians. Two additional characteristics are that they consisted of two parts, stanza and refrain, and they grew out of dance movement. They may originally have been used in various processions. Carols also may have been sung at church doors before and after the liturgy. The typical performance would involve the people's standing as the leader sang the verses, and then all would join in both dancing and singing on the refrain. Eventually, through repetition, the carols became familiar enough that all participants could join in singing stanzas as well as refrain.

The use of carols declined during the Reformation, but there was renewed interest in the late 19th century, with an expansion of the definition. Carol singing in churches as part of worship services did not arise until the late 19th century.

We presently use a more broad definition, which encompasses similar songs even if not of English origin, but which generally retain the characteristics of being strophic (having multiple stanzas), often traditional, and with texts related to Christmas. Whatever their form, these songs certainly enhance our worship experience, especially during the Advent/Christmas season.
