A MESSAGE FROM BISHOP DEVADHAR

Beloved in Christ:

Greetings in the precious and matchless name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

I write today to thank you with praise to our Creator God in and through the precious and matchless name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ using the words of the Psalmist, “Not to us, Lord, not to us but to your name be the glory, because of your love and faithfulness.” (Psalm 115:1). God’s amazing love and faithfulness are overflowing through each and every one of you!

So, I say to all clergy, laity, and leaders: Thank you! Gracias! Danke! Salamat! Merci! Wliwni! Obrigado! Gam-sa-hab-nee-da! Xiexie! Spasibo! Grazie! Shukran! Dhanyavaad!

Your generosity, your love for all God’s people; your embrace of John Wesley’s phrase, “the world is my parish;” your passion for peace and justice ministries; have been exemplified once again through your support of the ministries and missions of the New England Annual Conference. Your giving brought excitement to the leaders of our Conference, staff, and me personally as we reviewed the preliminary income and expense statement of our Annual Conference at a recent Conference Committee on Finance and Administration (CCFA) meeting.

Once again, we have been able to pay 100% of our obligation for the worldwide, local, and conference ministries and missions as well as some unexpected needs and challenges that emerged in 2021. We can truly celebrate this accomplishment after having reduced our Conference mission share budget for 2021.

All districts significantly improved in their participation, which resulted in a 3.99% increase in giving in 2021.

In my Thanksgiving letter to the Conference last November, I appealed to you, saying:

May I request that you reflect on Wesley’s words prayerfully — “Earn all you can, save all you can, give all you can.” — and consider donating the cost of one cup of coffee/tea/soda or meal a day from Thanksgiving to Christmas to your local church in addition to what you have pledged? Your church will keep 50% of your donation to benefit local ministries and the other 50% will be used for the Conference and World Missions portions of your church’s Mission Shares. If some churches collect more than they need, praise God! It will be put to good use.

Many of you took this challenge to heart and greatly blessed our Conference. Your generosity, along with the support of all our churches and faith communities, enabled the CCFA to pay the unexpected loss of income and budget deficit due to Covid for our camps and retreat center in 2021. As I said in my appeal, special giving will be used for “conference and world missions.” CCFA chose to use this special giving for our camp and retreat ministries which are doing marvelous work for the kin-dom of God! We were also able to meet our commitment to national and world missions.

All this was possible because you are the angels of God! You gave witness to a true understanding of “the world is my parish” for which I am always grateful and appreciative. I consider it as a privilege and blessing to be your Episcopal leader and give thanks for my predecessors who served this conference and laid the foundations on whose shoulders I stand.

Likewise, I am thankful for the great leadership we have at all levels of the Conference and at our partner ministries, Preachers’ Aid Society and United Methodist Foundation of New England. I especially want to share my gratitude for the CCFA’s faithful stewardship and our finance department staff’s hard work throughout the year, but particularly during the busy year-end season.

Lastly, I greatly appreciate your participation in the "[Brave Space Conversations](#)" which are underway with our Vision Forward Team. These conversations will assist the Vision Forward Team to bring recommendations to the 2022 Annual Conference Session, which will help make our conference truly committed to our mission and above all, to what God is calling us to do to extend God’s reign on this earth.

As we listen to what the Holy Spirit is saying to us, filled with the radical love of Christ, may I encourage all of you to participate in either the Feb 7 or Feb 28. conversation (please register at neacvision.org)?

Advent Gifts

Thanks to everyone who made a shoebox gift of personal care items and healthy snacks. Forty-five gift boxes were created. Beth Duxbury's volunteers made 20 of the gifts. Beth also purchased small backpacks which were especially appreciated by our homeless guests and are now spreading Wesley's name around the city. The plan had been to distribute the gift boxes/bags at the Jan. 2nd breakfast but Wesley was closed that Sunday because of Covid. Then Linda D'Acri and her family got approval to hold a Community Breakfast on Saturday, Feb. 12.

We were disappointed by the number of guests. About 18 of them chose gifts and we had also handed out some near Sally's Place where a free lunch is offered to anyone. All expressed delight at receiving theirs and thanked us more than once. Then an Outreach Worker from StandUp for Kids (SUFK) arrived at the breakfast and told us that the items we had collected are exactly what he needs to give out to people on the street or in overnight shelters such as Grace Hotel. StandUp for Kids works with homeless youth, ages 14 to 24. He was very happy to accept the remaining gifts.

Ash Wednesday at Wesley

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a season of reflection in which we are invited to deeper Christian discipleship. This year on Ash Wednesday, rather than having a service of corporate worship, Wesley will provide several different times and ways for you to enter into the season of Lent. It is hoped that having multiple options with a flexible schedule will enable as many people as possible to mark the beginning of the Lenten journey in a meaningful way.

On Ash Wednesday, March 2, from 11am-1pm and 4pm-6pm Pastor Moo will offer distribution of ashes and Holy Communion at the wooden footbridge in the rear parking lot. Should you wish to spend time in individual prayer and reflection either before or after receiving ashes and Communion outside, the sanctuary will be open during the same hours. Inside there will be a printed Ash Wednesday labyrinth meditation available for you to engage as you spend time in our sacred worship space. This meditative resource offers a scripture-based reflection focused on a finger labyrinth and invites you to set your intentions for your Lenten journey. It is our hope and prayer that the observance of Ash Wednesday will open the way for your spiritual pilgrimage through Lent.

What does it look like for you to observe a holy Lent? For many of us our Lenten spiritual practice includes use of topical devotional materials. To support you in deepening your spiritual journey this Lent we are making a variety of age-appropriate devotionals available to the congregation.

Mission Shares Paid for 2021

Well done and thank you to churches of the Commonwealth West District! Thanks to all who were intentional about increasing their giving, and to those who made valiant last-minute efforts. **Thanks to your combined giving, Commonwealth West Mission Share payments were up 4.9% compared to our 2020 giving.**

- **33 churches paid 100% or MORE of their MS**
- **27 churches increased their percentage in giving compared to 2020**
- **16 churches paid 56-96% on their MS**
- **68 churches paid something on their MS**
- **2 churches went from 0% in their 2020 giving to 100% in their 2021 giving!**

DID YOU KNOW?

This year Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 2. Most people are aware that the name *Ash Wednesday* relates to the ceremonial imposition of ashes on the foreheads of worshipers that occurs in the liturgy for the day in many denominations. Such liturgical use of ashes dates back at least to the 10th Century. However, the concept of ashes as a symbol of penitence is even older than that. In the early church, when public penitence was observed, penitents sprinkled ashes on their heads or received from the bishop a garment sprinkled with ashes. Ultimately this symbolism derives from the Bible in which the imagery of ashes centers primarily on the fragility of life. The association of ashes with death arises from the ancient military custom of burning enemy cities and appears in the Old Testament stories of warfare as well as in prophetic and apocalyptic passages. Since the word *ashes* is an image of total destruction, ashes are used in the Bible in expressions of intense grief and loss.

Imposition of ashes was not part of the official liturgy in the United Methodist tradition until relatively late in the 20th C. Daniel Benedict, retired elder and former Worship Resources Director of the United Methodist General Board of Discipleship (now known as Discipleship Ministries), explains:

“While many think of actions such as the imposition of ashes, signing with the cross, footwashing, and the use of incense as something that only Roman Catholics or high church Episcopalians do, there has been a move among Protestant churches, including United Methodists, to recover these more multisensory ways of worship. This is in keeping with a growing recognition that people have multiple ways of learning and praying. Worship that is oriented to the intellect or to the emotions, both interior, leaves out those who engage in prayer through vision, smell, touch, movement, and so forth. We are increasingly aware that people are formed in faith when practices become embedded in memory, nerves, muscles, and bone through sensory engagement.”¹

Ashes, a symbol of death and mortality, are placed on the forehead not in some random pattern, but in the shape of a cross. Since ashes are a meaningful symbol of our mortality, there is no more powerful way to remind us of our need for repentance and renewal. Receiving the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday links us with our biblical and historic predecessors in faith, but more importantly, on Ash Wednesday we begin our pilgrimage through Lent, a liturgical season which offers us opportunity not only for repentance but for recommitment to our faith and a life of Christian discipleship.
