#### A God Moment from Debi Reynolds

Have you ever thought about helping someone/group out because you can? For years I wanted to help with rescues but financially I couldn't. Then one day back in late October 2013 I was browsing Facebook, and I came across a post of a dog that needed help - needed a foster home to go to because he didn't get along with the boyfriend's dog. And because it was the boyfriend's house, Cody's owner had to let her dog go. It was a painful, difficult decision.

I talked it over with my husband at that time and reached out to the rescue to learn more about what it all entailed. Long of the short, the rescue took care of vet bills, I was to help him learn that he was a good dog, feed him, give him all the love, and help him find a new home.

That was the beginning of my rescue days. Since then, I have fostered around 100+ dogs/puppies too. Sometimes I had as many as 4 puppies, my own dog Sasha, and I would dog sit for friends. I once had 9 in my house all at once, plus 3 cats and a rabbit! Yes, it was absolutely chaotic and fun. I would do it all over again if I could.

One day in 2014 I was asked to bring another foster dog to an adoption event in CT. Her name was Lorena. I set out early that morning to my friend Janet's house in Springfield where Lorena ("Lo") was being dropped off. When I got there, I found a very scared dog, who in my opinion had no business at an adoption event. Yet, we took her. I sat on the floor against a wall for 4 hours with this dog, shaking and scared. Still being new to the rescue world and this being one of my first events, I was a bit shy. But I finally stood up and said enough, and we took her home. Later as I drove home, I couldn't get out of my head how scared she was. Yet, she was drooling a lot, and she was lethargic too. Still, I was new to this... so I was learning.

Later that evening Janet called me very upset. She said when the foster mom came to pick Lo up, she backed up to the corner of the crate and began shaking all over again. Lo was scared of her foster!!! The foster began yelling at her and eventually told Janet that she had given her drugs to calm her down for the event. Turns out she overdosed her. Well, that didn't sit well with me either, and I immediately set out to get her! The powers at be agreed that Lo had to be moved and let me take her.

On Mother's Day, May 11, 2014, Lorena joined the family along with my dog Sampson, and a puppy (who was in the process of being adopted). This girl was terrified of everyone and everything. Because I sat with her for so long that first day, a bond had begun to form. We worked at putting a harness on her, taking her out back to the fenced in yard, taking her out the front door for a walk, a food bowl being placed close to her... I could go on. Slowly, Lorena began to trust me more. She learned from the other dogs too. It took about two months before we could walk a small block, but she did it! Every day we worked at things, every day she was rewarded, every day was a new day.

In late October I took her to an adoption event in CT. John Gagnon's place had space indoors and outdoors, high walls and plenty of space where we could be off to the side for her to be comfortable.

At one point a young boy, Sam around 9yo, walked up to me and asked if he could pet my dog. I got down and said he could try, but I didn't want him disappointed if she wouldn't let him. To my surprise, and everyone around us, she walked up to him as he got down to her level and spoke so softly to her. She moved in closer... so many people just stopped and stared. This was amazing! In time, he was then able to take her leash and walk her around the fenced in area. When Sam's parents said, okay let's go see the other dogs, he said, 'Lorena's my dog mom, she's the one.' We set out to make this happen. After a few house visits and all the necessary paperwork, I took Lorena home on November 23.
