Dear Wesley UMC family,

This is my first Advent with all of you here at Wesley UMC and in Worcester, MA, and I am grateful to begin this holy season together. Advent is a time of waiting, watching, and hoping—and already, I have seen God's light in this community through your kindness, prayers, and smiles. I look forward to sharing this journey of hope with you, as we watch for Christ's light in our lives and in the world around us.



December is here, and we are walking together through the season of Advent. Advent begins in darkness, but it is not a scary time. It is a **holy, hopeful darkness**—a time of watching, waiting, hoping, and noticing God's light even in small ways.

Our Advent theme this year is "Watchful Hearts, Hopeful Lives." This means we try to keep our hearts open to God and live each day with hope.

Companions in Christ at Wesley United Methodist Church was established in 2001. The inaugural group was facilitated by Susan Proux and included four participants: Lorraine Kronberg, Barbara Ingrassia, Gail, and me.

During the 27th week of that first study, we discerned that the experience was profoundly meaningful and that it should be shared more widely within the Wesley community. After prayerful reflection, I felt God calling me to continue the ministry. Though unsure of my qualifications, I sensed God's assurance: "You are not going to do this alone." With that guidance, I stepped forward to lead.



Since that time, I have facilitated the full 28-week Companions in Christ study annually until the onset of COVID-19. Beginning in 2010, I also offered shorter 9- and 10-week companion groups, meeting monthly. As participants completed the 28-week program, they were invited to join the larger fellowship group.

Over the years, approximately thirty individuals have taken part in Companions in Christ, including: Caroly Bellil; Debbie O'Driscoll; Barbara Hunt; Susan Richards; Chris Flagg; Joan Decept; Lucy Simoneau; Jean Devali; Sandy McManus; Earl Flagg; Greg Decept; Gladys Adu-Poku; Alice Boateng; Lucy Annan; Linda D'Acri; Donna Hirtle; Janice England; Mercy Peacock; Cordelia Ferdinand; Judith Barton; and Marilyn Baptist.

This fall, the Tuesday morning group includes Veronica Winder, Jacki Wetton, and Linda D'Acri (who is joyfully engaging with the study again). The evening group includes Cordelia and Danielle Ferdinand.

Each gathering begins and ends with prayer, and I pray individually before every meeting for God's guidance. Confidentiality is emphasized to create a sacred space for sharing, listening, and spiritual growth. I host the ministry in my home, and I continue to do so because it brings me deep joy. We learn from one another, and the fellowship strengthens our walk with Christ.

By God's grace, Pastor Nizzi and I are planning a reunion gathering in late spring to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Companions in Christ ministry at Wesley UMC.

This is the Opening Prayer every time we gather:

Light of Christ, shine on our path. Chase away all darkness and lead us to the heart of God. Amen.

God Moment

A God Moment from Jean Grant

In late fall of 2020, I was making my way through the grocery store—one that I typically didn't go to. But it was closer and convenient. And our family had been going through a stressful health crisis (my husband had been in the hospital), so I needed to grab a few groceries and return home quickly. As I was following the arrows and lines with my shopping cart (it was the pandemic days, after all), I bumped into an acquaintance I hadn't seen in ages. Our sons went to preschool together, and Sue and I would see each other at social gatherings but it had been years.

Pandemic aside, I was still grappling with the realization of sending my oldest son to high school. Should he stay public or go private? Where? Which is best for his needs? I had been racked with indecision for a year. He is autistic, and I was worried about the environment and programming of the local public high school. Sue and I got talking and she was telling me about the private Catholic high school her oldest was attending—and how much she loved it. To her, it felt "right." It was a school on my list to check out, but I always pushed the thought away with excuses or justifications—the cost, the distance, the all-boy factor, will they approve of his special accommodations? The deadline for the application fast approached, so I went home and prayed upon it. And applied.

Seeing Sue on that day, while I was in a season of indecision and unrest, was a God Moment. God brought me to the lesser-visited store, to bump into Sue. God put that little whisper in my mind: this is the school for your son(s).

Four years later, as Ewan graduated from Saint John's, I could not have been more grateful for that fleeting yet life-changing moment with Sue in the grocery store. My sons have both blossomed at the school. Even now, I still send heavenward a prayer of gratitude for that day with Sue in the grocery store while Ewan embarks on another adventure: college.



DID YOU KNOW?

This past Sunday we began our observation of the liturgical season of Advent with the lighting of the first candle on the Advent Wreath. The custom of the Advent Wreath originated centuries ago in Northern Europe and was associated with a household tradition of burning lights during the Yule season. By the sixteenth century these became Advent symbols in Christian homes, but the use of the Advent Wreath as a symbol of the season in worship is a phenomenon of the last fifty years or so.

Did you know that in the early stages the candles of the Advent Wreath were white or red? Gradually a color scheme for the candles evolved which is based on the liturgical use of color. Our Advent Wreath has three purple candles and a pink candle in the outer circle of the wreath with a larger white candle in the center. Since Advent is a season of preparation, it has aspects which are both solemn and penitential. This is symbolized by the use of a deep purple (or in some traditions a deep blue) color, which also is the color of royalty, passion, and longing, for the first, second and fourth candles of the Advent Wreath. Advent also is a season of expectant waiting, a more joyous aspect of the season symbolized by the use of a pink candle for the third Sunday. Finally, on Christmas Eve we light the Christ candle in the center of the wreath. The white color of the Christ candle is a symbol of festivity.


Advent is a season in which we mark the passage of time—not only the waiting for our celebration of the birth of Jesus at Christmas but also preparing for his final coming at the end of time. The Advent Wreath helps us to mark that passage of time: as we watch the candles diminish in size we also see the accumulation of light. The gradual increase of light as a new candle is lit each Sunday reminds us of the approach of the Light of the World.
